CHOICE BOARD

Lessons in Governing with Mitch Landrieu

EXPLORE

We all make mistakes. Admitting those mistakes is a skill that we can practice. For more on how to confront mistakes, read <u>this short</u> article.

DISCUSS

Discuss one of the following questions with someone:

- Mitch says the two worst traits in a leader are ignorance and arrogance. Together, those traits can lead to decisions that hurt people. What does it mean to be ignorant? Why is it unhelpful? What does it mean to be arrogant? How can you avoid arrogance?
- Leaders need to hear from advisers who disagree with each other. Why is disagreement valuable to leadership?
- Mitch says he hasn't done anything meaningful in his life by himself—that it was all a team effort. What are your greatest accomplishments? Who helped you achieve them?

WRITE

Select one of the following writing prompts:

- Mitch discusses the importance of trustworthy counsel. Identify a leader you admire and research who their counselors or mentors were. How did these people influence this leader?
- Identify a disagreement you have participated in. Create a script for this conversation that incorporates some of Mitch's tips for respectful disagreements.
